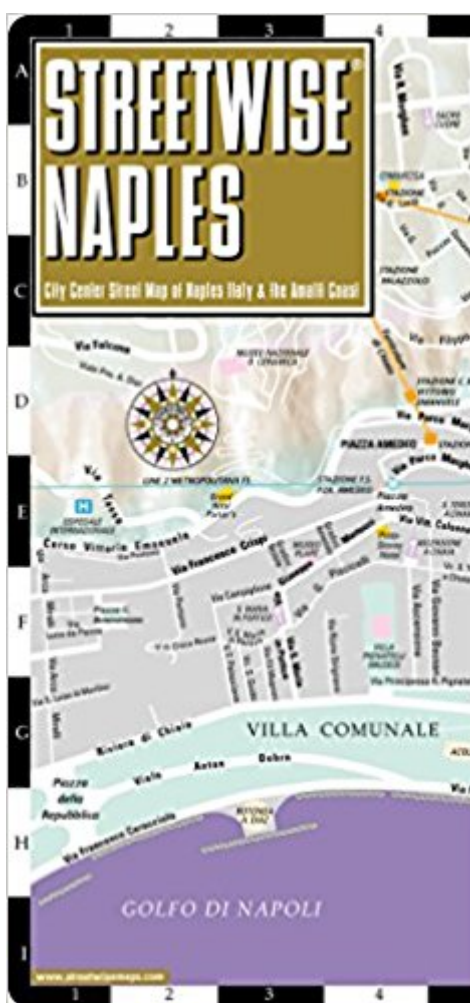

The company was founded in 1984 by Michael Brown, who had been in international publishing for many years, setting up subsidiaries for textbook publishers. In the 1970's, Brown traveled extensively throughout Africa, India, the Middle East and Southeast Asia. Brown would take a large

paper map, cut out the city center, folded it up and slip it into his pocket, thus preventing him from looking like a tourist in areas where discretion is the better part of travel. This was his tool for surviving. After many years on the road, Brown settled back in New York and decided to start his own business, based on the adaptations he had made to maps in his travels. His goal was to give someone the ability to navigate easily in unfamiliar terrain. He started with a new map format: the accordion fold. Such a simple idea, but at the time it was revolutionary. No more struggling to fold an awkward, oversized paper map. This new format would enable the user to blend in like a native, instead of stick out like a tourist. Brown then added lamination to ensure that the map would be a lasting tool. More important than the format was the design of the map itself. It had to be a map that not only succeeded above and beyond any map he had used, but was esthetically appealing as well. The look of it had to be as striking as the functionality. Color was introduced in a way that was never seen before in a map - vivid purple for water, soothing gray for the background of street grids, gold to highlight elements of the map. Clarity, conciseness and convenience in a very stylish package. Building the business was a 24 hour job. Brown sold the maps during the day, zipping around Manhattan making deliveries on his Harley Davidson. At night he packed the orders and did the design work. More titles were added, each title requiring months of research and design. Today, STREETWISE® produces over 130 titles for major destinations, regions and countries throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, Australia, Europe, the United Kingdom and Asia. We have grown from the back of a motorcycle to selling millions of maps around the world. Yet each title is still painstakingly researched and updated. STREETWISE® is one of the only, if not THE only map company that conducts research by walking or driving an area to ensure accuracy. After all, what good is the map if what you hold in your hands doesn't match what you see on the street sign? This is a nice compact durable map that fits conveniently into a large pocket. In theory it is the perfect companion to touring Lisbon by foot, tram and subway. Given that this is exactly how I used it, I have to report that the 2012 edition turned up to be deficient in two remarkable instances which (for me at least) calls its overall reliability into question. First, the 2012 edition doesn't show the Red Line subway going to the airport. At first blush, this is understandable since the airport subway

station only opened in July 2012. However, the map includes a legend for subway lines under construction (a broken red line) but doesn't even show that the line to airport was under construction. Given that subway construction is measured in years and not months, this is a pretty big omission. Second, on the blow-up map the red line between Alameda and Sao Sebastiao is simply omitted (while on the less detailed map this section of the line is shown). Lisbon isn't Tokyo--there are only four subway lines in Lisbon and these sorts of omissions can only be attributed to careless and sloppy editing. Not a good sign at all.

This is a very useful, laminated map that helps you get around the labyrinth of streets in the center of Naples. This map also includes smaller maps of Pompeii and Sorrento, and a larger map of the bay of Naples and the Amalfi coast. I would not have been able to see as much as I did, as easily as I did during my five days in Naples if I hadn't had this map. I believe, however, that the map needs to be updated: several stops on the subway lines, especially Linea 1, are not indicated on the map (e.g. Toledo and Municipio); furthermore, the map gives the impression that this subway line ends at Universita' when instead it continues to Piazza Garibaldi, where the main train station and bus terminals are located. Since the easiest way to get around Naples is on the subway lines, it would be helpful if all the stops were included on the map.

This map tries to cover too much of the region and ends up being pretty much useless for any of them. I've always bought and loved Streetwise maps before (for Rome, Venice, London and other cities) so I thought I would feel the same about this one--not so. It's poorly laid out, as others have mentioned, meaning you're constantly flipping from one panel to the next trying to figure out where you are. There's also not nearly enough detail say in the historic center to make it handy for navigating around small streets and finding things. I ended up tearing out a much better street map from one of my guidebooks and using that far more often. All in all a disappointment; I left it behind at my B&B hoping that maybe someone else in the future will get better use from it.

This is just as excellent as the Paris Streetwise Map. It folds to 9" X 4" and uses every available space on back and front as it expands to 9" X 36". On one side 2 panels are devoted to a street directory. Two panels show the Naples Area, giving the placement of the airport, harbor, train station and major highways in an overview. Five panels show the Centro Storica of Naples with major churches and museums shown and amazingly detailed street names very clearly printed. On the reverse, four panels are devoted to the harbor area. Two have insets of Sorrento and Pompeii with

major streets and sites. 3 panels show a topographical view of the Gulf of Naples, Amalfi Coast, and Gulf of Salerno, as far as Avelino on the north, almost to Paestum on the south. I am a map lover and this is a very satisfying map to give one one's bearings. Only wish it had insets for Positano and Amalfi. Sturdy and compact.

I have always used the Streetwise maps for our families' vacations, but have to say that their map of Lisbon, Portugal is horrible. Even at the top of the index it states that "all sites and streets aren't indicated". This indicates to me that as a map it is incomplete; and that this is. To find one of the biggest monuments in Lisbon, the Rua Augusto Arch, there was no information in the index at all. I was able to find the Rua Augusto, and the map showed a series of buildings at one end but never mentioned that one of these was the Arch. Ridiculous!!!!!! I have been using a tourist map ever since. DO NOT PURCHASE "THIS" map!!!!!! (Other maps I have used from Streetwise we're: Rome; London; Paris, and Madrid and highly recommend them... Not Lisbon.

I think Streetwise Maps live up to the old saying, "don't leave home without it". You can carry all the electronic devices with maps downloaded and there is still nothing like a slim as paper, laminated map to tuck in a cargo pants pocket. A paper map never loses its charge. It gives you the primary attractions, hotels, the streets and public transportation locations. I use these maps for whatever major city I visit. They hold up to pouring rain and never break on the folds. The print is also large enough to read easily.

I like Streetwise maps, but not this one. It's rather a set of maps: Naples, Sorrento, Pompeii the Amalfi Coast. So if you want to see where in Italy the city of Naples is, this map is for you. If you want to have a map of Naples with metro stops and tram line - buy something else. This one is useless to take for a walk in Naples.

Yes!! Good for the 'on foot' tourist and also the "motorized" one!

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
