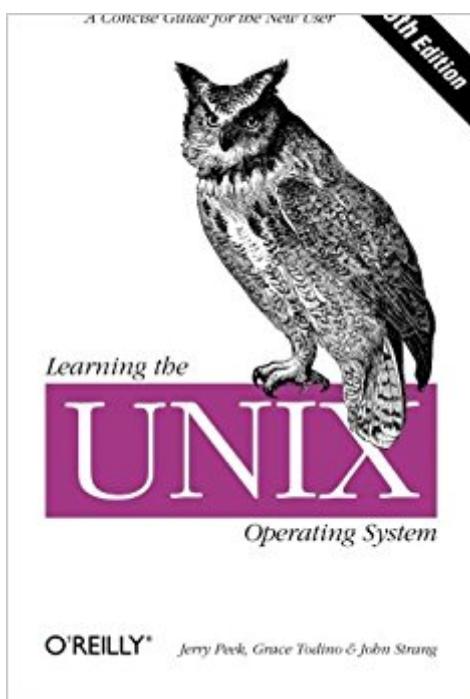

Learning The UNIX Operating System, Fifth Edition



Synopsis

If you are new to Unix, this concise book will tell you just what you need to get started and no more. Unix was one of the first operating systems written in C, a high-level programming language, and its natural portability and low price made it a popular choice among universities. Initially, two main dialects of Unix existed: one produced by AT&T known as System V, and one developed at UC Berkeley and known as BSD. In recent years, many other dialects have been created, including the highly popular Linux operating system and the new Mac OS X (a derivative of BSD). Learning the Unix Operating System is a handy book for someone just starting with Unix or Linux, and it's an ideal primer for Mac and PC users of the Internet who need to know a little about Unix on the systems they visit. The fifth edition is the most effective introduction to Unix in print, covering Internet usage for email, file transfers, web browsing, and many major and minor updates to help the reader navigate the ever-expanding capabilities of the operating system: In response to the popularity of Linux, the book now focuses on the popular bash shell preferred by most Linux users. Since the release of the fourth edition, the Internet and its many functions has become part of most computer user's lives. A new chapter explains how to use ftp, pine for mail, and offers useful knowledge on how to surf the web. Today everyone is concerned about security. With this in mind, the author has included tips throughout the text on security basics, especially in the Internet and networking sections. The book includes a completely updated quick reference card to make it easier for the reader to access the key functions of the command line.

I am a beginner to UNIX and I need to learn it for graduate school-as most of my work will be done on a mac command line via terminal. I cannot begin to express how happy I am with this book. This book is definitely written for beginners. It explains things in good detail (while skimming over other more complex things). This is a great introduction book and I will buy another advanced book when I am done with this one. My only wish for this book is that it would come-at the back or front of it-a list of commands that it covers with a brief description of what they are-like a cheat sheet. The book (on the upper right hand corner) says that it includes a quick ref card, but I never received it-it's not in the book. In lieu of this, I've just been writing the commands down in the last couple of blank pages of the book for quick reference. It's time consuming, but I learn more that way (trying to look at the positive). I will highly recommend this book to anyone that pulled up terminal for the first time and is staring at a blank, white screen-with eyes wide open, glazed over. That was me when I ordered this book.

This feedback has nothing to do with the content of the book but instead is about the print quality of the book. I think this must have been an "print on demand" book because it looks like complete garbage. It's difficult to read as the thiner parts of the loops in letters didn't register on the page - almost like a cheap laser printer that's running out of toner. Frankly this just didn't meet my expectations for a new print book. I would recommend finding a used book or buying from someone other than .Book Content Review: It's ok... but feels super dated despite being a refreshed edition. This book might be ok if you've NEVER used a computer before but it's unfocused with it's approach of discussing super basic concepts and then tossing in more advanced topics. If you've ever had a basic entry level computer course with an instructor who doesn't know what they're doing then this book is the equivalent with it's disjointed random topics jumping from one thing to the next. There are better introductory books out there - and frankly wikipedia will get you further than this book.

This text is perfect for beginners who would like an introduction to UNIX or UNIX like environments. I purchased it thinking that it would go more indepth into the filesystem, kernel, and other deeper matters, and it doesn't; but it's still good!Even with years of experience using Linux/UNIX, this book gives a nearly perfect presentation of the basics of navigating using a terminal, the essential commands of terminal use, and even some things that have come to pass as obsolete, but are still great to read about (I'm looking at you, pine).

I made a mistake buying this book. It may not be apparent from the cover graphics that the name of this book is 'Learning the (in smaller print) UNIX Operating System' and not just 'Unix operating System' - which I was looking for. When the book arrived I was disappointed by the small size of the book, nobody told me the book is so thin, and then taking a closer look at the title made it clear. I browsed thru it anyway and I almost bit my nails thinking why did somebody not write this book while I had my first encounter with Unix! This book would have made it so much easier. This book is not for me, I was looking for more advanced system admin concepts, but after all these I had to give this book a good rating! The book is very well written, very organized and almost completely free of

flab (except for why Unix is better for sight and hearing impaired users! Who needs to know that anyway?) Final word - if you just got an Unix account or are about to get one, get this book, it's worth the money. Please note that it's better to be used as a practical guide and reference rather than as a book that covers the theory behind Unix.
