

I was just in NYC a few weeks ago with my children and this book was very useful! A must read for those looking to really explore the "BIG Apple".

As a NYC tour guide, I was looking forward to getting this book. Was so disappointed to discover how amateurish this guide is. A high school student could have done a better job! There's no

organization, and it's hard to see where the parks are. There's no standard format for quickly viewing where they are. Unbelievably, there's no map, no organizing the parks by area, or by type (indoor vs. outdoor, etc.) The descriptions are very brief. The photos are all black and white and distorted. Honestly, this book looks like it was compiled in word by using Google and spending a weekend doing it. A real guide would have public transportation directions, nearest restrooms, hours, etc.

In principle an interesting guide to an intriguing subject, but why is it executed so sloppily? most of the photos are for some unknown reason compressed from horizontal into vertical, so they become totally distorted. they are printed without any contrast. not very inviting to go and visit these places, which was the intention on the book!
