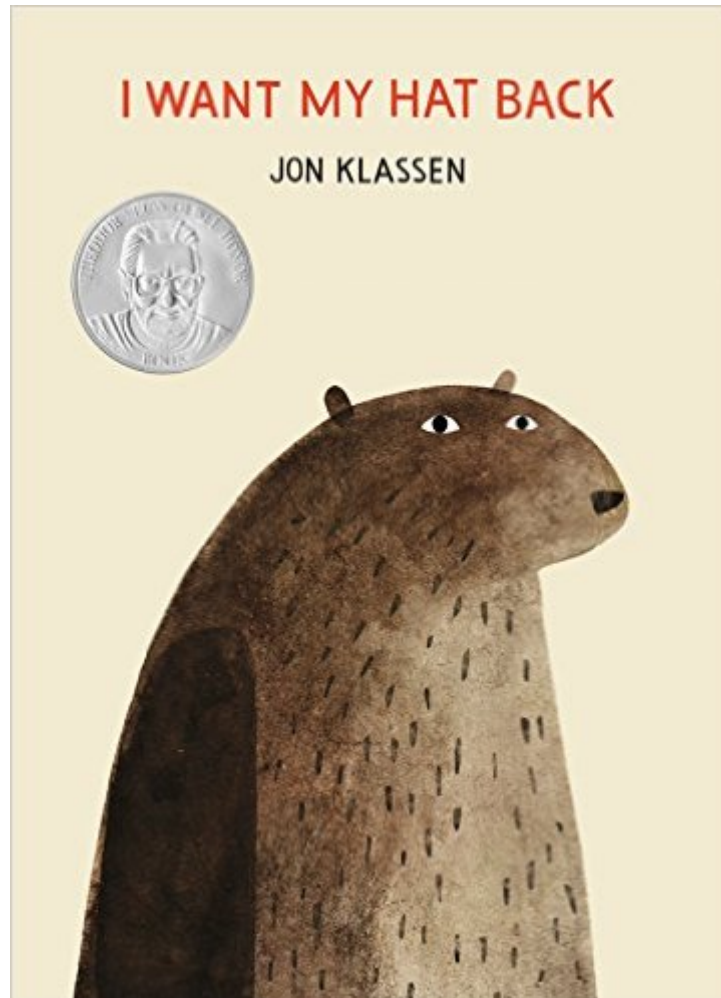

Synopsis

Patiently and politely, he asks the animals he comes across, one by one, whether they have seen it. Each animal says no, some more elaborately than others. Jon Klassen received the 2010 Canadian Governor General's Award for his illustrations in Caroline Stutson's CAT'S NIGHT OUT. He also created illustrations for the popular series THE INCORRIGIBLE CHILDREN OF ASHTON PLACE and served as an illustrator on the animated feature film Coraline. I WANT MY HAT BACK is the first book he has both written and illustrated. Originally from Niagara Falls, Canada, he lives in Los Angeles.

The ending might be upsetting for the smallest of children, but the older kids loved the wicked twist at the end and the illustrations were wonderful.

Fun to read with children! Good to start a conversation "what do you think.... what would you do...."

As Psyche pointed out (Jan 16, 2016 review), this is basically the same story as This Is Not My Hat. I prefer the latter book because the ending is more ambiguous; maybe the big fish ate the little fish, maybe he didn't. Great illustrations.
